

of Science's document also should be forwarded to the Vice-Chancellors Committee as still representing the views of the Court ; that it should be supplemented by a quotation from page 5 of the Memorandum which accompanied the Quinquennial Estimates for 1967-72, where similar recommendations were briefly set out ; that the Court should point out that lack of funds inhibits action ; and, finally, that the letter from the Secretary of the Appointments Board should also be forwarded as representing the views and experience of the Board itself.

2. *Professor A. M. Honeyman.*—With reference to Court Minutes of 22 January 1968, Item XIII 6., a letter dated 25 January 1968 from Dr. M. A. Ghul is circulated (on file).

It was *agreed* to await the views of the Master of St. Salvator's College.

3. *Car Parking.*—With reference to Court Minutes of 22 January 1968, Item XIII 7., the Town Council have noted the University's views and are taking no further action meantime.

4. *Sir Alexander J. H. Russell's Bequest.*—The University was informed in February 1964 by the Trustees of the late Sir Alexander J. H. Russell, C.B.E., LL.D., of Bridge of Allan, that he had bequeathed to the University of St. Andrews at his death in 1958 £5000 (nominal) of 3% Savings Bonds 1965/75. The money was to be administered by the University as patrons for the endowment of a Scholarship to be known as "The Muir-Russell Scholarship," to be awarded from time to time to a student of, or a graduate in, Medicine for the purpose of enabling the holder either to obtain by higher study a special medical qualification or to undertake research in a Branch of Medical Science. Preference was to be given for study or research in the field of Tropical Medicine or Hygiene. The Scholarship was normally to be tenable for two years, but in special circumstances for a third year. There were other stipulations which are on record.

The Bequest was subject to a life rent of his widow, who died in January 1964. Following Lady Russell's death a number of legal difficulties required to be settled. The Executors have now informed the University that these difficulties have been settled and that the final figures for distribution have been drawn up. The Bequest is now worth £3975.

It will be necessary to include this Benefaction in the List of Endowments for distribution between the Universities of St. Andrews and of Dundee under the Universities (Scotland) Act 1966, Schedule 6, Paragraph 12 (b).

5. *Benefaction—Mrs. May Smith.*—Mrs. May Smith of Nassau, Bahamas, who studied under Professor Nisbet in 1947, has given £12,000 to the University. Of this sum, £2000 is for the Library in MacIntosh Hall and £10,000 to be spent by Professor Nisbet in his discretion for the purposes of his Department.
